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democracy lawyer and layperson alike the los angeles review of books in his major work acclaimed historian and judicial authority melvin urofsky examines the great dissents throughout the court s long history constitutional dialogue is one of the ways in which we as a people reinvent and reinvigorate our democratic society the supreme court has interpreted the meaning of the constitution acknowledged that the court s majority opinions have not always been right and initiated a critical discourse about what a particular decision should mean before fashioning subsequent decisions largely through the power of dissent urofsky shows how the practice grew slowly but steadily beginning with the infamous and now overturned case of dred scott v sandford 1857 during which chief justice roger taney s opinion upheld slavery and ending with the present age of incivility in which reasoned dialogue seems less and less possible dissent on the court and off urofsky argues in this major work has been a crucial ingredient in keeping the constitution alive and must continue to be so

journalism does not create democracy and democracy does not invent journalism but what is the relationship between them this question is at the heart of this book by world renowned sociologist and media scholar michael schudson focusing on the u s media but seeing them in a comparative context schudson brings his understanding of news as at once a story telling and fact centered practice to bear on a variety of controversies about what public knowledge today is and what it should be should experts have a role in governing democracies is news melodramatic or is it ironic or is it both at different times in the title essay schudson even

suggests that journalism serves the interests of free expression and democracy best when it least lives up to the demands of media critics for deep thought and analysis passion for the sensational event may be news at its democratically most powerful lively provocative unconventional and deeply informed by a rich understanding of journalism s history this work collects the best of schudson s recent writings including several pieces published here for the first time

freedom of speech in international law charts the minimum protections for speech enshrined in international human rights law it not only addresses the problems facing free speech today but offers recommendations to give effect to the international law obligation to protect freedom of expression

most studies of ancient warfare focus only on the

greeks and the romans but this sweeping study covers the whole of the ancient world from greece and rome to the near east then eastward to parthia india and china bradford transports the reader into the midst of ancient battles behind such great leaders as thutmose iii ashurbanipal alexander hannibal caesar and the first emperor of china he details the rise and fall of empires the role of leadership and the development of tactics and strategy one sees the clash of peoples nomads against agricultural societies infantry against cavalry as well as the greatest technological change in history the combination of the composite bow and the chariot this readable account analyzes ancient armies in terms of modern military doctrine allowing the reader to make comparisons between the combatants recruitment for example varied tremendously with romans drawing from a limited pool of recruits for service terms of twenty to thirty years and chinese planners preferring a large pool with short term service while various types of governments prepared for and waged war in significantly different ways bradford finds that better organization led to success on the battlefield and that for the most part societal innovation was more important than technological innovation the ongoing discussion of the lessons of ancient warfare around the globe will provide valuable insights for interested general readers and military professionals alike

in recent years there has been an explosion of writing on the topic of human dignity across a plethora of different academic disciplines despite this explosion of interest there is one group critical legal scholars that has devoted little if any attention to human dignity this book argues that these scholars should attend to human dignity a concept rich enough to support a whole range of progressive ambitions particularly in the field of international law it synthesizes certain liberal arguments about the good of self authorship with the critical legal philosophy of roberto unger and the capabilities approach to agency of amartya sen to formulate a unique conception of human dignity the author argues how human dignity flows from an individual s capacity for self authorship as defined by the set of expressive capabilities s he possesses and the book demonstrates how this conception can enrich our understanding of international human rights law by making the amplification of human dignity its fundamental orientation

winner national jewish book awards in contemporary jewish life practice myra h kraft memorial award a crucial new lens on repentance atonement forgiveness and repair from harm from personal transgressions to our culture s most painful and unresolved issues american culture focuses on letting go of grudges and redemption narratives instead of the perpetrator s obligations or recompense for harmed parties as survivor communities have pointed out these emphases have too often only caused more harm but danya rutenberg knew there was a better model rooted in the work of the medieval philosopher maimonides for maimonides upon whose work rutenberg elaborates forgiveness is much less important than the repair work to which the person who caused harm is obligated the word traditionally translated as repentance really means something more like return and in this book returning is a restoration as much as is possible to the victim and for the perpetrator of harm a coming back in humility and intentionality to behaving as the person we might like to believe we are maimonides laid out five steps naming and owning harm starting to change transformation restitution and accepting consequences apology and making different choices applying this lens to both our personal relationships and some of the most significant and painful issues of our day including systemic racism and the legacy of enslavement sexual violence and harassment in the wake of metoo and native american land rights on repentance and repair helps us envision a way forward rooted in traditional jewish concepts while doggedly accessible and available to people from any or no religious background on repentance and repair is a book for anyone who

cares about creating a country and culture that is more whole than the one in which we live and for anyone who has been hurt or who is struggling to take responsibility for their mistakes

china's war on terror is among its most prominent and least understood of campaigns with links to the global jihad an indigenous insurgency threatens the government's grip on a massive region of north western china known as xinjiang riots bombings ambushes and assassinations have rocked the region under separatist and islamist banners china

the next novel in the typhon pact adventure set in the universe of star trek the next generation on a diplomatic mission to the planet andor captain picard and the crew of the enterprise e bear witness to the rank devastation resulting from the borg invasion with the reproductive issues that have long plagued the andorian people reaching crisis level avenues of research that at first held great promise have proven largely unhelpful and may well indeed be worsening the problem despite the federation's seeming inability to

provide assistance and growing doubt over its commitment to a staunch longtime ally andorian scientists now offer renewed hope for a solution however many segments of andorian society are protesting this controversial new approach and more radical sects are beginning to make their displeasure known by any means available in response president nanietta bacco has sent the enterprise crew and a team of diplomats and scientists to andor to convene a summit in the hope of demonstrating that the federation s pledge to helping andor is sincere but the typhon pact is watching and their interests may very well lead the andorian people down an even more treacherous path

this book examines the origins of genocide and mass murder in the everyday conflicts of ordinary people exacerbated by special interests we examine cases harming people simply because they are considered unworthy and undeserving for instance if they are dehumanized we confine our attention to genocide mass murder large scale killing motivated by hate or desire for gain and fascism as an ideology since it usually advocates and leads to such killing the book draws on social psychology especially recent work on the psychology of prejudice much new information on the psychology of fear hate intolerance and violence has appeared in recent years the world has also learned more on the funding of dehumanization by giant corporations via dark money and on the psychology of genocidal leaders this allows us to construct a much more detailed back story of why people erupt into mass killing of minorities and vulnerable populations we thus go on to deal with the whole problem of evil or at least apparently irrational killing in general broadening the

perspective to include politics economics and society at large we draw on psychology sociology economics political science public health anthropology and biology in a uniquely cross disciplinary work

our democracy is now under attack from within and without as it has never been since the civil war yet the evidence is clear that americans are as a whole civically illiterate and woefully unprepared for the assault our democracy is undergoing for americans to be prepared to function effectively as constructive citizens in their democracy in the 21st century and beyond they must be equipped with knowledge and a skill set that is not effectively taught today fighting for democracy is a call to deconstruct our civics education in this country and reconstruct it to meet the complex needs and pressures our democracy faces today certainly the civics of tomorrow must include continuing what we teach today about the structure organization and how at least in theory our government is supposed to function but there is far far more that must be taught to deal with the siege our democracy is now under fighting for democracy provides a roadmap for improving our civic education so we can withstand this anti democratic movement now underway here we must teach americans about servant leadership and how to recognize counterfeit leaders who wish to lead us with leadership styles that are toxic and antithetical to democracy including autocracy fascism kleptocracy and populism we must return to a national consensus as to the importance in a democracy of a free news media that is an arbiter of truth and not simply a funnel for one sided biased opinions and editorials masquerading as factual news americans must relearn how to think

critically recognize major change in the public square as well as readily identify when we are not being told the truth are being gaslighted and worse becoming willing to accept conspiracy theories and radicalization of our political parties as being normative we must gain a clearer understanding of the multi dimensional concept of freedom democratic norms and values our history as well as to once again value public service we must reconnect with a love for the idea of democracy itself which includes a keen appreciation for the glue that holds it together the common good at the same time we must rediscover why our founders believed democracy while sometimes messy was ultimately the one form of government that could truly serve we the people and provide americans with the best means possible for pursuing as a nation our hopes dreams our freedom and the pursuit of happiness all these concepts ideas truths and more are a must for americans to know in order to be able to fight and for us to keep our democracy in today s increasingly anti democratic world that is the purpose of fighting for democracy make no mistake about our democracy we the people must learn now and quickly how to improve our civically literacy including how to become better informed and more constructively engaged citizens if we do not we will not be able to effectively fight to keep our democracy and risk losing everything we have fought for since our nation s birth and american democracy is indeed worth fighting for not just for us today but most importantly for our children grandchildren and all future generations of americans fighting for democracy was written to equip us to do exactly that

the divided families problem is a serious social

from their beginnings as the asylum attendants of the 19th century mental health nurses have come a long way this comprehensive volume is the first book in over twenty years to explore the history of mental health nursing and during this period the landscape has transformed as the large institutions have been replaced by services in the community mccrae and nolan examine how the role of mental health nursing has evolved in a social and professional context brought to life by an abundance of anecdotal accounts moving from the early nineteenth to the end of the twentieth century the book s nine chronologically

ordered chapters follow the development from untrained attendants in the pauper lunatic asylums to the professionally qualified nurses of the twentieth century and finally consider the rundown and closure of the mental hospitals from nurses perspectives throughout the argument is made that whilst the training organisation and environment of mental health nursing has changed the aim has remained essentially the same to develop a therapeutic relationship with people in distress mcrae and nolan look forward as well as back and highlight significant messages for the future of mental health care for mental health nursing to be meaningfully directed we must first understand the place from which this field has developed this scholarly but accessible book is aimed at anyone with an interest in mental health or social history and will also act as a useful resource for policy makers managers and mental health workers

more than fifty years before the american revolution boston was in revolt against the tyrannies of the crown puritan authority and superstition this is the story of a fateful year that prefigured the events of 1776 in the fever of 1721 stephen coss brings to life an amazing cast of characters in a year that changed the course of medical history american journalism and colonial revolution including cotton mather the great puritan preacher son of the president of harvard college zabdiel boylston a doctor whose name is on one of boston s grand avenues james and his younger brother benjamin franklin and elisha cooke and his protégé samuel adams during the worst smallpox epidemic in boston history mather convinced doctor boylston to try a procedure that he believed would prevent death by making an incision in the arm of a healthy

person and implanting it with smallpox inoculation led to vaccination one of the most profound medical discoveries in history public outrage forced boylston into hiding and mather s house was firebombed a political fever also raged elisha cooke was challenging the crown for control of the colony and finally forced royal governor samuel shute to flee massachusetts samuel adams and the patriots would build on this to resist the british in the run up to the american revolution and a bold young printer james franklin who was on the wrong side of the controversy on inoculation launched america s first independent newspaper and landed in jail his teenage brother and apprentice benjamin franklin however learned his trade in james s shop and became a father of the independence movement one by one the atmosphere in boston in 1721 simmered and ultimately boiled over leading to the full drama of the american revolution

who grew up in newly industrialized manchester england and would come to build a quiet but fierce religious tradition on the opposite side of the atlantic even as the society she founded spread across the united states the welsh industrialist robert owen came to the indiana frontier to build an egalitarian rationalist utopia he called the new moral world a decade later followers of the french visionary charles fourier blanketed america with colonies devoted to inaugurating a new millennium of pleasure and fraternity meanwhile the french radical Étienne cabot sailed to texas with hopes of establishing a communist paradise dedicated to ideals that would be echoed in the next century and in new york s oneida community a brilliant vermonter named john humphrey noyes set about creating a new society in which the human spirit could finally be perfected in the image of god over time these movements fell apart and the national mood that had inspired them was drowned out by the dream of westward expansion and the waking nightmare of the civil war their most galvanizing ideas however lived on and their audacity has influenced countless political movements since their stories remain an inspiration for everyone who seeks to build a better world for all who ask what should the future look like praise for paradise now uncommonly smart and beautifully written a triumph of scholarship and narration five stand alone community studies and a coherent often spellbinding history of the united states during its tumultuous first half century although never less than evenhanded and sometimes deliciously wry jennings writes with obvious affection for his subjects to read paradise now is to be dazzled humbled and occasionally flabbergasted by the amount of energy and talent sacrificed at utopia s altar the new york times

book review writing an impartial respectful account of these philanthropies and follies is no small task but mr jennings largely pulls it off with insight and aplomb indulgently sympathetic to the utopian impulse in general he tells a good story his explanations of the various reformist credos are patient thought provoking and entertaining the wall street journal as a tour guide jennings is thoughtful engaging and witty in the right doses he makes the subject his own with fresh eyes and a crisp narrative rich with detail in the end jennings writes the communards disregard for the world as it exists sealed their fate but in revisiting their stories he makes a compelling case that our present day deficit of imagination could be similarly fated san francisco chronicle

in popular legal and academic discourses the term human rights is now almost always discussed in relation to its opposite human rights abuses syllabi textbooks and articles focus largely on victimization and trauma with scarcely a mention of a positive dimension joy especially is often discounted and disregarded william paul simmons asserts that there is a time and place and necessity in human rights work for being

joyful joyful human rights leads us to challenge human rights foundations afresh focusing on joy shifts the way we view victims perpetrators activists and martyrs and mitigates our propensity to express paternalistic or heroic attitudes toward human rights victims victims experience joy indeed it is often what sustains them and in many cases what best facilitates their recovery from trauma instead of reducing individuals merely to victim status or the tragedies they have experienced human rights workers can help harmed individuals reclaim their full humanity which includes positive emotions such as joy a joy centered approach provides new insights into foundational human rights issues such as motivations of perpetrators trauma and survivorship the work of social movements and activists philosophical and historical origins of human rights and the politicization of human rights many concepts rarely discussed in the field play important roles here including social erotics clowning dancing expressive arts therapy posttraumatic growth and the buddhist terms metta loving kindness and mudita sympathetic joy joyful human rights provides a new framework one based upon a more comprehensive understanding of human experiences for theorizing and practicing a more affirmative and robust notion of human rights

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the words rebellion and revolution have gained renewed prominence in the vocabulary of world politics and so has the question of justifiable armed resistance in this book Christopher J. Finlay extends just war theory to provide a rigorous and systematic account of the right to resist oppression and of the forms of armed force it can justify he specifies the circumstances in which rebels have the right to claim recognition as legitimate actors in revolutionary wars against domestic tyranny and injustice and wars of

liberation against wrongful foreign occupation and colonialism arguing that violence is permissible only in a narrow range of cases Finlay shows that the rules of engagement vary during and between different conflicts and explores the potential for irregular tactics to become justifiable such as non-uniformed guerrillas and civilian disguise the assassination of political leaders and regime officials and the waging of terrorist war against civilian targets
